n our second day in Jerusalem, Paul and I went to the Kotel (the Western Wall). The Kotel is considered the holiest site in Judaism. On our way, we stopped at a souvenir shop in the Armenian quarter of the Old City to visit the congenial owner George, whom I have known from prior trips to Israel. George is an Armenian believer in Jesus who is strong and vocal about his faith.

When we arrived, George warmly greeted us and introduced us to his friend, Eli. Eli was a Jewish man who told us that he was descended from the Kohenim (the Levitical priests from the tribe of Levi). He further shared with us his spiritual journey in and out of Jewish orthodoxy. The Lord allowed us to candidly share with Eli the wonderful reality that the Jewish Messiah has already come and is soon to return. The evidence that the Messiah has already come is proven by the many fulfilled Messianic prophecies that found their literal and historical fulfillment in the birth, life, ministry, death, and resurrection of Yeshua of Nazareth.

At this point in the conversation, Eli recalled that his name in Hebrew reminded him of the opening verse of Psalm 22, which says, "My God,

My God, why have You forgotten me."
In Hebrew or Aramaic, the verse reads, "Eli, Eli lama sabachthani."
Eli in Hebrew means, "My God." I excitedly told Eli that

Psalm 22 was a Messianic Psalm quoted by Yeshua on the cross (Matthew 27:46). Psalm 22, which has been popularly called "The Psalm of the Cross," predicted in detail the type of death the Messiah would suffer. The Psalm clearly speaks of Jesus as the atoning Messiah crucified for our sins. I quoted Psalm 22:16 (*"They bave pierced My bands and feet"*) to drive home the point that Jesus' crucifixion was being alluded to here in this verse and was foretold by King David some 1,000 years before Jesus was born!

Eli was noticeably intrigued at all this. Paul and I were able to give him a list of these prophecies found in the Tenach that were fulfilled in the life of Yeshua. To that end, he gladly accepted a Hebrew New Testament for further study. Eli told us he was going to start reading it right away!

At the Western Wall, the Lord opened to us more witnessing opportunities for Yeshua. By the providence of God, Paul and I were able

to share with a few of the Orthodox Jews. We identified Yeshua as the Messiah and spoke of the return of the Jews to the land of Israel to be reunited with this returning Messiah. We gave them Messianic Gospel tracts.



At the synagogue adjacent to the Western Wall, we placed some Hebrew New Testaments on the bookshelves. As we were leaving, Paul ran into a young Rabbi whose name was Yoshi. Paul told him that we love the Jewish people, that our hearts are with them, and that God has not forsaken them (Romans 11:1-2). Paul was able to share Yeshua the Messiah with him by giving him a Gospel tract. The Rabbi told Paul that

he worked for an organization that helps poor Jewish families in Jerusalem. Paul quoted Psalm 37:25 to encourage Yoshi that God will provide all his needs and Paul gave him a donation to help him along. \$\text{\$\text{\$\$}}\$

ave you ever been uncertain of where you stand on a particular issue until one day something is said or done that clearly defines for you the truth? I recently

had such an experience regarding the war in Iraq. I have listened, I think objectively, to the criticisms and to the explanations on both sides for and against our occupation in Iraq. I have vacillated from time to time as I drink in the news coverage and listen to all the political commentaries. Clearly there are unresolved problems and great challenges that we are facing there. It has been a difficult and costly mission. But that is all the more reason why we need

to believe that our American men and women are risking their lives for a purpose, a future free from terrorism.

About a month ago, I met a young American soldier who had just returned from Iraq. I'm a realtor and was showing him a house because he and his new bride (whom he met while they were both deployed in Bagdad) want to settle down and have a baby. Her unit is scheduled to return to Iraq around the first of the year so their baby plans are being postponed for now. We ended up talking for hours and his stories disturbed me deeply. I could not fathom some of the experiences this 26 year old was describing to me. I couldn't imagine it but I could see the horror of it come across his face as he explained how difficult it is to clean up the mess of a human being after a missile head penetrates and explodes inside a humvee. I asked him if he believes in God and his answer was an interesting one. He said, "I do now." What is it inside a young man that would make him believe in a good and Holy God amidst the evil and unspeakable violence of war? I believe it is that strange heavenly gift described in Hebrews that appropriately appears when it's most needed. "Now Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). What are we all hoping for with Iraq? Is it simply that it won't all be in vain?

I was troubled for many days about the conversation I had with this young man. His first hand account caused me to question my support for this war. I was and am grieved at the suffering and sacrifice that our young Americans are facing over there. In the clutches of my own emotion, I got angry at our government and began to question God. I felt bombarded everyday from every direction in the media about how wrong this war is and how we need to get out. But in the midst of all of this, God began to show me that sometimes we, especially spoiled and pampered Americans, lose sight of the vision when suffering is involved. Why do we struggle to understand the concept of suffering as a means to an end? Why do we think that if something isn't clean and tidy, it has to be wrong? Then it began to occur to me how easily we forget from where we have come!

What was the cost for the birth of our own nation? And as we look back at a civil war that tore us apart, for a time, wasn't it a necessary war for our society to be freed from the oppression of slavery? It started with Lincoln's vision, but was slavery completely abolished at the end of the civil war?

No, it took generations. Iraq is a work in progress and history has proven time and again that this kind of progress cannot be measured in days or even years, but in generations. The generation of Israelites that were led out of Egypt were the fathers of those who entered the Promised Land. Abraham was given the promise, but his grandson became the father of the tribes of Israel. It seems that Americans have lost the ability to keep the vision of freedom in their scope

while Muslim extremists not only are willing to die for, but also train and sacrifice their children for, their cause. Why can't Americans unite like that?! Why isn't Cindy Sheehan on trial for treason? Because Americans are vision impaired and spoon fed by the liberal media.

I am frustrated at the constant anti-Bush and anti-war protesting. What a nightmare for the families of our troops

who have to face this media barrage everyday knowing that their child, brother, sister, husband or wife may never come home and for what? I want to scream from the roof tops... "America get behind your government, get behind your troops! Wake up



from your own fascist liberal slumber and get the vision. A future free from terrorism has to start somewhere. Why not Iraq? The alternative is to pull out and give Iran the green light to build up another terrorist infrastructure from which to carry out future plans for the destruction of Israel and America.

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Matthew 13 and the Prophetic Parables About the Present Age



The Parable of Hidden Treasure Part 4 (Matthew 13:44)

acob was exiled in the desert of Padan-Aram some twenty years where he worked for his miserly and ill-mannered Gentile uncle Laban. Among the sons of men, who would have ever thought the conniving supplanter Jacob, an aimless nomad of the wilderness, would one day be a royal prince to God, having the name Israel? Based on his scheming character, Jacob certainly showed no outward indication of being a chosen person greatly esteemed by the Lord. Better yet, look at the earthly life of Joseph. Joseph was despised by his eleven brothers, but highly beloved of his father Jacob. Out of envy and contempt, his brothers sold him into slavery in Egypt, hidden away. Later,




after being falsely accused by Potiphar's wife, he was forsaken and thrown into prison. There for two long trying years Joseph remained secluded and imprisoned in absolute obscurity. Who would have believed that Joseph, a man apparently forsaken and cast away as a goodfor-nothing criminal, would be delivered from the dungeon and placed as co-regent with Pharaoh on the throne of Egypt? Joseph, like the nation I srael, was a precious vessel temporarily hidden but later to be revealed and used mightily by God.

The Patriarchs of I srael were all like a hidden treasure among the multitudes of the heathen world with apparently no outward hint of divine favor, prestige, or great importance. This is where the history of I srael

began, and that is where this parable begins. While in Egypt, I srael existed in a concealed and mundane condition, but in spite of this, God foresaw the special value and redemptive impact they would have on the world through Jesus the Messiah. For this preeminent reason, the Lord saw I srael as His treasure valued above all other people on the earth. "For you are a holy people to the Lord your God. The Lord your God has chosen you to be a peculiar treasure to Him, above all people that are upon the face of the earth" (Deuteronomy 7:6). Four hundred years after Jacob and his family migrated to Egypt to be with Joseph, the children of Israel multiplied into a community of about three million or so people. What condition were they to be discovered in? For over three hundred years, they were slaves of the cruel despotic Pharaohs. During these long agonizing years of bondage, the children of I srael were reduced to the inhumane level of slavery under the stinging whips of Pharaoh's taskmasters. While in this ignominious state, nothing marked them as the noble, renowned, and distinct people chosen by God to be His nation of kings and priests. To Pharaoh, the Hebrew slaves were a lowly but necessary cogwheel in the Egyptian work industry. But in the Lord's foreknowledge, they were a hidden treasure ready to be revealed in the fullness of time. This came to pass when the Lord powerfully sent forth Moses the great deliverer to bring them out of Egypt by God's high calling to be His holy and superior nation over all nations (Deuteronomy 14:2).

I srael's exodus from Egypt lead to the Promised Land and the Lord called them a "holy people," a "peculiar treasure" above all the nations of the earth. They began as an obscure and hidden nation, tiny and unnoticed among the millions of Gentile inhabitants of the ancient world. But "Again the kingdom of heaven is like treasure hid in a field, which a man found and hid; and for joy over it he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field."

God brought them out of virtual obscurity to attain spiritual and political supremacy. This happened particularly under the reigns of King David and King Solomon but later went into decline. As I srael dwelt securely in the land God gave to them, they fell away and forsook Him and failed to keep His law. In return, the Lord persistently reminded the disobedient people of how He brought

In scripture, Nehemiah stands out because he had a vision. But he needed his people to get behind him, to work together with him and when the enemy rose up and tried to thwart the Jews' efforts to rebuild the wall, they didn't let up or allow themselves to be distracted from their vision. Instead they armed themselves with one hand, and with the other, continued to work toward accomplishing the goal.

I think that Americans' response to



all who oppose this war should be Nehemiah's response to those opposed to his efforts' in his day, "I am doing a great work and cannot come down. Why should the work cease while I leave it and go down to you?"

(Nehemiah 6:3). The enemy is trying to thwart our efforts to overcome this evil in our world. His tools are strife, division and confusion. I was almost deceived by it all. But I see clearly that if we don't begin to mend our differences and stand together, we won't have to worry about the terrorists' threats to our beloved country. We will implode from within. As Jesus has said, "a house divided against itself cannot stand."



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
